

### Parent/Caregiver Feedback

The following are the top responses to questions in the spring 2023 Parent/Caregiver Surveys. These results are aggregated for the entire School District due to varying response rates from individual schools.

#### Top Reasons to Walk or Bike

- Walking and biking encourage an active, healthy lifestyle (60%)
- Walking and biking are fun for my family/ household (12%)
- Other (12%)
- Reducing driving minimizes crashes and congestion (9%)

#### Barriers to Walking/Biking to School

- Poor driving behavior on streets near school (distracted driving, speeding, not yielding at crosswalks) (25%)
- Bad weather (19%)
- It takes too long to walk or bike to school (12%)
- None of the above I don't have any concerns (10%)
