Introduction

HAPTER

Alameda County Safe Routes to Schools promotes safe and healthy transportation choices as being fun and easy options for parents and children throughout the County.

The 2013-2014 school year was Alameda County Safe Routes to Schools' (SR2S) eighth year of promoting active transportation choices to students. The program has expanded annually and now reaches more than 100 schools across all areas of the County.

The program is administered by the Alameda County Transportation Commission (Alameda CTC) and funded by Federal funds and local Measure B funds.

2013-2014 Highlights

Alameda County SR2S continued to promote walking, biking, and carpooling through wellestablished countywide events as well as testing out new activities and programs to improve student and school engagement. In the 2013-2014 school year, Alameda County SR2S increased the number of schools participating in the overall program and increased program participation in core activities to record levels. Successes from the 2013-2014 school year include:

- 105 schools participated in the comprehensive program .
- 50 schools received technical assistance
- 84% of schools held three or more events, and 46% held five or more events.
- 91% of schools participated in International Walk & Roll to School Day, a 10% increase from fall 2012.
- 68% of schools participated in the Golden Sneaker Contest in March 2014, a 14% increase from spring 2013.

- 84% of schools participated in Bike to School Day in May 2014, a 24% increase from 2013. Over 5,000 students biked to school, more than twice the number that rode during the event in 2013.
- The BikeMobile mobile bicycle repair service made 115 visits during the school year, repaired over 2,100 bikes, and more than doubled bicycle ridership based on counts of bicycles before and after the visit.
- 39 K-8 schools held regular Walk and Roll to School Days.
- 16 elementary schools organized parent-led Walking School Buses.




Figure 1 Schools Participating in Countywide Events

Figure 1 shows the growth in number of schools participating in the countywide events offered through the Alameda County SR2S program.

Most schools participating in the Alameda County SR2S program have increased rates of walking and bicycling, according to the ongoing evaluation of how students get to school (based on a partial data set). The analysis also found a correlation between the number of walking and biking programs and active transportation mode share.

Strong relationships exist between Safe Routes activities and events and their impact on student travel behaviors:

- Schools with more walking programs tend to have a higher active mode share.
- Schools with more bicycling programs tend to have a higher biking mode share.




Figure 2 Number of Events at Participating Schools, 2013-2014 School Year

About this Report

This report covers programming undertaken during the 2013-2014 school year. Specifically, it:

Program Overview

In 2013-2014, Alameda County's Safe Routes to Schools program offered three major countywide events: International Walk&Roll to School Day in October, the Golden Sneaker Contest in March, and Bike to School Day in May. Throughout the year, schools participated in a variety of ongoing education and encouragement activities.

History

Alameda County's Safe Routes to Schools (SR2S) program began in 2006 as a Caltrans grant-funded pilot program at two schools in Oakland. In 2007, the Alameda County Transportation Improvement Authority authorized \$1.3 million in Measure B grant funding to continue the program¹. With renewed funds, by July 2011 the program had expanded to 88 schools and all four of the County's planning areas.

In July 2011, as a program of the Alameda CTC, Alameda County SR2S was funded with Federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds, Federal Surface Transportation Program funds, and local Measure B funds.

The current program funding cycle runs from 2013-2016, with plans to incrementally expand program participation and breadth of events and services offered to participating schools.

The 5 E's

Alameda County's SR2S program is guided by the 5 E's framework that is a hallmark of successful SR2S programs:

Encouragement programs, such as Walk and Roll to School Days, provide incentives and support to help children and their parents try walking or bicycling instead of driving.

Education programs, such as the puppet show assembly, teach key messages about pedestrian and bicyclist safety, health, and the joys of active transportation. Classroom activities teach students how to navigate busy streets and make the connection between active transportation, health, and the environment.

Engineering programs, such as school site assessments, help identify and address physical barriers to active transport.

Enforcement programs reinforce legal and respectful walking, bicycling, and driving behaviors. Partnerships with law enforcement officials improve traffic safety around schools.

Evaluation programs help schools measure their success at encouraging walking and bicycling.

Comprehensive vs Technical Assistance

Alameda County SR2S provides two levels of assistance as program resources currently cannot accommodate the demand for comprehensive SR2S programming in the County. Therefore, a competitive application process is undertaken to put schools into two categories:

Schools accepted into the comprehensive program receive one-on-one school-based assistance from a site coordinator, are eligible for a variety of highquality programming free of charge, and may receive support materials such as posters, banners, safety incentives, and safety vests. Each site coordinator works with between 15-20 schools.

Schools not accepted into the comprehensive program may receive technical assistance from the site coordinators through their school district's Safe Routes to School Task Force, but are generally not eligible for free programming or incentives. Schools accepting technical assistance agree to participate in a minimum number of events each year.

In 2013-2014, the Alameda County SR2S program expanded comprehensive programming to 99 elementary and middle schools. The high school program, which had been pilot tested from 2011-2013, transitioned to a permanent part of the Alameda County SR2S program, with six schools enrolled.




Figure 3 Growth of Alameda County SR2S Program 2006-07 through 2013-14

The current program funding cycle includes expansion of several program elements, including:

- Number of schools in the comprehensive program by at least 10% every school year
- BikeMobile visits throughout the County
- Bicycle safety training, including rodeos, family cycling clinics, adult safety courses, and the establishment of a diversion program for ticketed bicyclists
- More robust evaluation tracking and reporting procedures, to better understand effectiveness of program elements and provide future program direction




Figure 4 2013-2014 Alameda County Safe Routes to Schools Participating Schools

Program Activities and Delivery

Alameda County SR2S programming offers a variety of activities and events for schools and students. Schools selected to participate in the program are assigned a Site Coordinator. The Site Coordinators work with designated School Champions, who are volunteer parents, teachers, or school staff that assist in program implementation at a specific school site.

Table 1 shows activities offered during the 2013-2014 school year.

Schools not accepted into the comprehensive program may receive technical assistance from the Site Coordinators through their school district's Safe Routes to School Task Force or by consulting with a Safe Routes to Schools staff member. During the 2013-2014 school year, 50 schools received technical assistance through the Alameda County SR2S program.

Elementary and Middle School Programming

In the 2013-2014 school year, 99 elementary and middle schools participated in theSafe Routes comprehensive program. The program offered three major countywide events, with ongoing educational and encouragement events and activities available based on school interest and capacity.

Selection Process

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The Alameda County SR2S Program seeks to distribute Safe Routes programming equitably around the County. All schools in the County were invited during the summer months of 2013 to apply to the 2013-2014 program.

The program team compiled demographic, land use, and collision data for all applicants, which resulted in a score and rank for each school. In addition to the 99 elementary and middle schools selected for the Alameda County SR2S program, all six high schools that participated in the 2012-2013 high school pilot program were invited to participate in the 2013-2014 school year.

The program team used student enrollment to determine a target number of schools to participate from each school district, aiming for equitable participation from each of Alameda CTC's four planning areas. Within each school district, highscoring new schools were prioritized for program participation, with reapplying schools with high rates of program participation accepted until reaching the target number for each school district. The final choice in selected schools for each district was vetted by SR2S staff and Alameda CTC staff.

The program team selected 99 K-8 schools from a pool of applicants to participate during the 2013-2014 school year. Selected schools signed a letter of commitment stating that they will create a Safe




Figure 5 Comparison of Participation Targets by District and 2013-2014 Schools

Routes Team, identify a School Champion, conduct student hand tallies, assist with scheduling and outreach to support the program, and host at least three Safe Routes events.

The SR2S program reached a greater level of geographic equity in the 2013-2014 school year. The SR2S program was able to proportionally enroll a greater number of schools in the south and east areas of Alameda County, which were historically under-represented areas in past years.

Program Delivery

A Site Coordinator from the Alameda County SR2S staff is assigned to each school accepted into the program. The Site Coordinator works one-on-one with the school's administration and volunteer School Champion to organize the activities and events. In middle schools, students are encouraged to actively participate in running events.

Once schools have been accepted into the Alameda County SR2S program, the extent of their participation varies. Schools who have been in the program often have several scheduled events. New schools may require intensive support from a site coordinator to organize and plan events. During the 2013-2014 school year, program activities focused on three countywide events: International Walk & Roll to School Day, the Golden Sneaker Contest, and Bike to School Day. The program's goal is to have all comprehensive schools participate in all three countywide events.

The number of schools participating in each event grew during the 2013-2014 school year by an average of 16%. Student participation in each event also increased, indicating support for these elements of the SR2S program.

Countywide Events

International Walk and Roll to School Day

Since 2006, Alameda County SR2S has kicked off each school year with International Walk & Roll to School Day in early October. The event began abroad in 1994 to bring communities together to focus on safer and improved streets, promote healthier habits, and conserve the environment.¹ In 2013, millions of families and community leaders in over 40 countries celebrated in October.

In Alameda County, International Walk & Roll to School Day is the largest SR2S event, celebrated by schools as a kickoff event for a full school year of programming. Site Coordinators work with School Champions to publicize and plan this school-wide celebration where all are encouraged to walk and bike. In 2013, the event was held on October 9, with schools celebrating throughout the week.

Alameda County SR2S supports school efforts with outreach materials, activities such as the bicycle blender or bicycle trivia wheel to enhance the celebrations, and coordination of media events. This event raises visibility of the Safe Routes program and is the foundation of the year's activities.

Highlights

During the month of October 2013, 103 schools in Alameda County participated in International Walk & Roll to School Day, including 5 high schools, 10 middle schools, 2 K-8 schools, and 86 elementary schools. This marked a 29% increase over the number of schools participating in the event in 2012. Of the 103 participating schools in 2013, 96 were enrolled in the Alameda County SR2S comprehensive program.

Based on student tallies during the event, 65% of students walked or rolled and 80% arrived using green modes (including walking, bicycling, skating, carpooling, taking transit and bussing). On a typical day, approximately 49% of students arrive via green modes, indicating a 63% increase in green trips during the event.

There were almost 5,000 more non-single family vehicles trips in 2013 than in 2012, indicating continued growth in green trips and potential for mode shift on a more regular basis.

Staff conducted outreach with eight different task forces in the month leading up to the event to encourage participation and to distribute incentive awards for students. International Walk & Roll to

Golden Sneaker Contest

The Golden Sneaker Contest, first rolled out in 2010, continues to be a program highlight. The contest encourages families to get active and reduce pollution by walking, biking, and carpooling to school over two weeks in March. Classrooms track how students get to school, then the classroom with the highest rate of active travel at each school wins the coveted Golden Sneaker trophy.

Participating schools publicize the event, track how students travel, and throw a party celebrating the contest and the winning classroom. The contest targets each age group differently; elementary school teachers track trips using a large poster for the classroom, while middle school students run the contest themselves with assistance from Site Coordinators. High school students use the data to calculate carbon emissions savings.

Highlights

In March 2014, students in 71 schools across Alameda County participated in the Golden Sneaker Contest, representing a 25% increase over the 57 schools that participated in 2013 and an 87% increase over the 38 schools that participated in 2012. It is estimated that 34,000 students participated in the contest countywide.

Schools that, in addition to completing student travel hand tallies in fall 2013, pledged all-school participation during the Golden Sneaker Contest became automatically eligible for the "Platinum Sneaker Award" – a countywide award for the school with the greatest increase in the number of students using green modes of transportation during the contest. Over 40 schools were eligible for the Platinum Sneaker Award in 2014, with Kolb Elementary in Dublin winning this year's Platinum Sneaker Award.

While a typical day sees 39% of Kolb students get to school using green modes, 62% of students did so during the Golden Sneaker Contest. This translated to 175 additional students getting to school in greener ways each day. Kolb Elementary was honored with the coveted Platinum Sneaker Award by the Alameda CTC Commission at the end of March.

Bike to School Day

Cities around the Bay Area hold popular Bike to Work Day events each year in May. In 2014, Alameda County SR2S organized the fourth Bike to School Day in parallel to celebrate biking at 95 schools, 88 of which participate in the comprehensive SR2S program. The 95 schools participating in Bike to School Day represent a continued increase in participation, from 65 schools in May 2013 and 38 schools in May 2012.

Schools were invited to host "Energizer Stations" to give passing bicyclists Bike to Work Day gift bags, refreshments, and local bicycling information. Some schools organized special morning events with activities like pedal-powered smoothies made on Bike Blenders.

Highlights

In May 2014, 73 elementary schools, 13 middle schools, 2 K-8 schools, and 7 high schools participated in Bike to School Day. Over 5,000 students rode bikes to school on the day of the event, more than double the number that rode in 2013.

Ongoing Student Programs

Monthly Walk and Roll to School Days

Schools can encourage students to walk, ride, or scooter to school regularly with monthly or weekly Walk and Roll to School Days. In the monthly newsletter provided by the Alameda County SR2S Program are outreach materials, text that school champions can insert into their own school newsletters and email announcements, and suggested activities in a given theme for each month. Monthly Walk and Roll to School Day messages for school champions are provided in both English and Spanish.

Highlights

During the 2013-2014 school year, 39 schools held monthly Walk and Roll to School Days, with an average of 90 students participating each month at Garfield Elementary School in San Leandro.

Walking School Bus

Walking school buses and bike trains are coordinated efforts where students walk or bike to school together with adult leaders. This allows parents to take turns leading the group of students to and from school. This program overcomes concerns parents have with allowing their children to walk or bike to school by providing adult supervision for the trip.

Alameda County SR2S trains parent leaders, provides reflective vests, and helps organize people into their routes. Additionally, the program develops Walking School Bus route maps for comprehensive program schools upon request.

Highlights

During 2013-2014, 16 schools had regular walking school bus programs. Based on student hand tally data, there are higher rates of walking at schools with walking school bus programs.

Walking school bus maps have been developed for 11 schools and provided as a resource at school events, such as kindergarten orientation and parent meetings.

Bike Mobile

The BikeMobile travels to schools and events throughout the County to provide free bicycle repair services and safety tips for bicycling. First launched as an independent pilot program in 2011, the BikeMobile has been fully integrated with programming and offerings from the Alameda County SR2S program. The BikeMobile makes visits at SR2S-participating schools as well as other schools and community events.

Highlights

The BikeMobile made 115 visits throughout the County during the 2013-2014 school year. There were 67 school-site visits, representing over 37% of available school days, and 48 communitywide visits, including Oakland's Earth Expo, and health fairs throughout the County where children and their families were in attendance.

During 2013-2014, BikeMobile staff repaired over 2,400 bicycles, 40% more than the previous school year. Where bicycles were counted before and after the BikeMobile visit, the average increase in bicycles after the visit was 96%.


Skills Drills

"Skills Drills" bicycle safety education classes are conducted in elementary schools for 4th and 5th grade students. Classes are led by a team of youth cycling instructors and teach students proper bike handling techniques, how to use hand signals, read traffic signs, and maneuver through intersections, as well as how to perform a bike safety check and adjust a helmets. Skillz Drills are led by certified instructors² and at least one teacher, and are held in a school parking lot or playground area.

Highlights

During 2013-2014, Alameda County SR2S offered bike rodeos in 10 school districts. In Albany and Fremont, bicycle rodeos were provided outside of the Alameda County SR2S program.

Over 1,400 students participated in bike rodeos at 18 schools during 2013-2014.



















Drive Your Bike Program

This week-long curriculum for middle school and Family Cycling Workshops are a complementary high school students includes lessons about bike safety, helmet adjustment, and traffic signs. After in-class training during P.E., students move to the gym or blacktop to learn basic bike handling skills.

Once they have shown competence in the basic skills, students practice their skills by biking with instructors on streets in their school's neighborhood.

Highlights

Alameda County SR2S worked with P.E. teachers to provide bicycle education to students at nine schools, reaching almost 4,000 students. In addition, the City of Albany organized and funded The Family Cycling Workshops involved over 50 PE bicycle education at schools in the City.

Family Cycling Workshops

element coordinated with the Alameda County SR2S Program to provide bicycling instruction to parents and their children. League of American Bicyclists Certified instructors lead families in a four-hour class that includes games, safety drills, skill building, and a neighborhood ride.

Alameda County SR2S funded three family cycling workshops during the 2013-2014 school year, supporting other workshops occurring around the County.

School, Parent, and Community Programs

Educator Guide/Teacher Trainings

Alameda County SR2S collaborated with the Safe Routes to Schools program in San Mateo County to develop a K-5 Safe Routes to School Educator Guide that is aligned with Common Core State Standards and Next Generation Science Standards. The Guide is designed to support flexible implementation to facilitate activities in the classroom, a club, or after school program. The Guide was released spring 2013 and includes:

- Engaging grade level activities for the classroom and after school
- California State Content Standards correlations
- Themes on safety, community, health, and environment
- Ways to connect to Safe Routes to Schools program components
- Safety DVD and This is the Way we Go to School book

Interested teachers can attend a 30-minute orientation session presented by Site Coordinators, and can download the Guide through the program web site.



Walk and Roll K-5 Educator Guide

Activities for Creating Safe and Healthy Communities

The Walk and Roll Educator Guide provides in-class activities that relate to California common core standards and that teachers can use to support Safe Routes efforts.

Highlights

During the 2013-2014 school year, 20 schools received educator guide presentations, more than twice the number of schools that received trainings the previous year. The educator guide was also introduced at numerous school events.

SR2S Task Forces

Parents, teachers, and other school community members convened monthly in Task Forces to discuss strategies for promoting Safe Routes. Nine Task Forces are active around the County. In central and south areas of the County, Promotores Steering Committee meetings, made up of community members engaged in health education, were held regularly as well.

Highlights

Task Forces were active in Alameda, Albany, Berkeley, Dublin, Fremont, Oakland, New Haven, and San Leandro. School districts in Hayward, San Lorenzo, and Castro Valley participated in the Unincorporated Task Force. At these monthly meetings, schools shared information regarding activities they were planning and collaborated on events. In Berkeley, the Task Force worked with the SR2S site coordinator to organize a successful district-wide bike festival for the second year in a row.

School Site Assessments

During a school site assessment, the school community observes conditions and behaviors around the school site that make it difficult or unsafe to walk or bicycle. Participants identify and evaluate safety issues, particularly in the walking and biking environment within a quarter-mile of the school. School parents, staff, students, city or county planners and engineers, neighbors, traffic safety officers, and local elected officials are invited.

As part of a school site assessment, planners and designers in Alameda County's SR2S program team present improvement recommendations to the school community, then submit the plans to the local city or county planning agency to advocate for traffic and engineering changes in the community.

Highlights

Alameda County SR2S staff conducted site assessments at 7 schools during the 2013-2014 school year.

Highlights

Site Coordinators attended or presented at PTA meetings at 16 schools, in addition to School Site Councils, English-language advisory councils, principal coffees, Parent Center gatherings, and other similar meetings where parents can get involved in school activities. At several of these schools, Coordinators returned to multiple meetings and worked with School Champions to raise awareness of the Alameda County SR2S program.

Marin Elementary School in Albany has Safe Routes built into their PTA structure, which supports the program activities with funding and by identifying parent volunteers.

PTA/Parent Meetings

Alameda County SR2S Site Coordinators reached out to parents from the beginning of the school year, attending PTA and other parent meetings. Site Coordinators presented information about the Safe Routes program and asked for volunteers and participants for upcoming events.

Other Events and Strategies

In addition to formal activities and events, several schools and communities hosted a variety of fun events that Alameda County SR2S participated in. In some cases, the standard Safe Routes activities encouraged School Champions to take on new or different events to encourage active transportation.

Bicycle Essay Contest

Alameda County Transportation Commissioner and County Supervisor Scott Haggerty sponsored an essay contest to get more elementary school students using healthy and active transportation. Students at Brier Elementary and Weibel Elementary participated.

Two students from each school were eligible to win the grand prize of a new bicycle with helmets, locks, and lights.

In their essays, students answered the questions:

- What would your neighborhood be like if more people rode bikes to school and work?
- How would a bicycle make your life better, or if you already have a bike, how does it make your life better?
- What are some ways that bicycles can make the world a better place to live? If you were in charge of your school, how would you get more kids to bike and not take cars so much?

Success Story Bicycle Festivals

Tyrrell Elementary Hayward

In its first year in the program, Tyrell Elementary in Hayward held a Pop-up Bike Festival in May. Students and their families enjoyed bikeblended smoothies and tricycles races while enjoying music provided by Kaiser Permanente Educational Theatre's Super Weevil and his pedal-powered sound system. Hayward Police Department Sergeant Rich Butler was there on his patrol bicycle and the BikeMobile made about 50 repairs. Hayward Mayor Michael Sweeney also stopped by to congratulate Tyrell's principal on such a successful event.

Bicycle festivals were held throughout the County, including Alameda, Berkeley, Oakland, and Newark.

High School Pilot Program

During the 2013-2014 school year, the high school program shifted into a fully integrated aspect of the Alameda County Safe Routes to School program, with staff working closely with students through clubs, academies, and elective classes.

The six schools that participated in the pilot program during the 2012-2013 school year again participated in this year's high school program: Albany High, Dublin High, Foothill High, Irvington High, Oakland Technical High, and San Lorenzo High.

Students assessed site design and transportation issues at their schools, and learned about event planning while working on collaborative projects to encourage their peers to walk, bicycle, take transit, and carpool to school.

New programming included a Cocoa for Carpools Day, integration of SRTS and social media, and new partnerships

Program Approach

The high school program engages students around transportation issues, teaching them about the impacts of their travel decisions and helping them organize events to reach out to their peers. The program's model uses student leaders to initiate projects that interest them and are relevant to their school, while leveraging the existing materials and resources provided by the overarching Alameda County SR2S program for major events.

Goals of the high school program include:

- Increasing student awareness of health and environmental impacts of driving, particularly through event organizing, assessments, presentations, and guest speakers.
- Empowering young people to make change in their communities. Youth participate in hands-on activities and organize events to understand transportation issues and encourage their peers to try walking, bicycling, and carpooling. Experiences such as School Site Assessments help students make concrete associations about how the built environment affects their lives. Guest speakers connect the classroom work with careers and show students that their efforts can make a difference.

- Reduction of single occupancy vehicle car trips to decrease traffic around high schools, minimizing congestion and air pollution. The program promotes transportation alternatives as being "cool," social, and as giving students more independence.
- Flexibility in approach allows the program to find the best way of engaging students, whether through an after-school club or in a class.
- The creation of a more equitable environment for all youth in Alameda County. The program aims to give all teens the option of walking, biking, and taking public transit, regardless of their location, ethnicity, socio-economic status or physical ability.

• Increased outreach to parents, who figure heavily in students' transportation choices. Presentations to PTAs and PTSAs and other organizations helped parents participate in Safe Routes activities and support their students' efforts.


Selection Process

Schools that participated in the 2013-2013 pilot were invited to continue Safe Routes programming in the 2013-2014 school year. The six participating high schools represent all four Alameda County planning areas as well as the diverse ethnic and economic backgrounds in the County.

Countywide Event

Program Delivery

Alameda County SR2S delivered high school programming through existing school clubs and classes. The High School Coordinator worked closely with teachers and students to deliver the programming. Table 2 summarizes program delivery methods and results.

The "Student Leaders" listed in the table helped organize Safe Routes events and activities at each listed school. The "School Group" was the affiliated school organization through which the Site Coordinators worked at each school.

Program Activities

During 2013-2014, every high school participated in the countywide events, with two schools also celebrating a high school-focused Carpool Day, piloted as Cocoa for Carpools. Students also worked on a variety of collaborative projects.

Additionally, the High School Coordinator convened the Safe Routes Fellows, in which two student leaders from each school served on a countywide council, similar to SR2S Task Forces convened citywide. The Fellows met monthly to discuss ways

to improve event outreach to youth throughout the County and to share ideas.

A summary of programs implemented is given in Table 3.

How Students Travel

The Alameda County Safe Routes to Schools program seeks to increase the numbers of students who use green (walking or biking) or shared (carpooling, school bus, and transit) modes to get to and from school.

While the Alameda County Safe Routes to School (SR2S) program has gathered student and family travel data for several years, it has been only since the 2011 data collection effort that a consistent methodology and comprehensive surveying across the County has provided sufficient data for a robust evaluation.

Data Sources

HAPTER

Alameda County SR2S collects travel behavior data from two primary sources: student hand tallies and parent surveys. The hand tallies tend to present a more accurate estimate of student travel during the week, while parent surveys gather additional information about parental perceptions and attitudes toward walking and bicycling, as well as the Safe Routes to Schools program. The data collection methodology was adjusted for the 2013-2014 school year, due to the resource intensive nature of data collection. In the two previous years, student hand tallies and parent surveys were collected twice a year. However, for the 2013-2014 school year, student hand tallies were collected only in the fall and parent surveys were collected only in the spring. The following data analysis compares fall 2013 hand tallies to those collected in previous fall semesters and spring 2014 parent surveys with surveys collected during previous spring semesters, for consistency.

For hand tallies, a teacher or Safe Routes staff member asks students to raise their hands to indicate how they got to school—by walking, biking, riding the school bus, taking transit, using the family car, carpooling, or other mode.


The fall 2013 hand tallies were gathered in 644 classrooms at 78 schools.¹

1 Of the 105 schools contacted, 78 returned hand tallies, for a response rate of 74.3 percent. Hand tallies were conducted in two classrooms per grade at most participating schools.

Parent surveys are sent home in backpack mail or via a link to an online survey parents can complete. Surveys ask parents how their children get to and from school, and ask opinion questions about mode choice and their participation in the Alameda County SR2S program.

The spring 2014 parent surveys were collected from 4,478 families, accounting for over 5,000 students, a 26% increase from 2012-2013.

While parent surveys and hand tallies use different data collection methods, mode split results for the same semester have been relatively consistent for Alameda County.





Countywide Results

According to student hand tally data taken after International Walk & Roll to School Day in fall 2013, active transportation accounts for 36% of trips Countywide, up from fall 2012. Shared transportation makes up 13% of the mode split, with carpooling at 8%, school busses at almost 3%, and transit at 2%. About half (51%) of school trips Countywide are made in a family vehicle, not part of a carpool.

Spring 2014 parent surveys indicate that 32% of trips to and from school are made using active transportation, while shared modes account for 14% and driving alone accounts for 55%.

Parent Survey

Mode Split by Planning Area




Figure 8 Mode Split by Planning Area, Fall 2013 Hand Tally Data

Alameda County is made up of four planning areas, which vary greatly in geographic and land use characteristics. School travel habits tend to vary between the planning areas, shown in Figure 8.

- Schools in the north planning area have the highest **walking** rates (34%), followed by central and south planning areas at about 29% each.
- Rates of **bicycle** ridership are relatively close throughout the County, varying from 2% in the central planning area to 5% in the south (up from 2.7% in fall 2012). Schools in the east and south planning areas have higher rates of carpooling, at 10.7% and 8.8%, respectively.
- **Single family vehicle** trips account for a similar share of the mode split in the central, south, and east planning areas, and is lowest in the north part of the County.

Mode Split by Distance

The parent survey asks how far students live from their school. This information helps evaluate whether Safe Routes successfully encourages active transportation among families that live within walking or biking distance. Students who live within a mile of school represent the greatest potential for the Alameda County SR2S program to increase active transportation to and from school.




Figure 9 Mode Split by Distance from School, Spring 2014 Parent Survey Data

Shown in Figure 9, 56% of students living within a quarter-mile of school currently walk or bike, but one-third are driven in the family car, indicating opportunity for additional mode shift.

Students who live more than two miles from school represent an opportunity to increase shared modes.

The data indicates that 69% of students living further than two miles are currently driven to school in a single family vehicle, a decrease from 77% in spring 2012. Spring 2014 parent surveys also show that overall rates of carpooling are slightly higher than in spring 2013, and further analysis indicates a link to higher rates of carpooling among schools that were new to the program in 2013-2014. This indicates an opportunity as the program expands to a very diverse set of schools. Schools located in less urban locations, with students living further away, will need to focus on carpooling and other shared modes in order to shift away from single family vehicle trips.

Comparison to Prior Years




Figure 10 Mode Shift Across Semesters, Hand Tally Data

Countywide, hand tally data collected each semester since spring 2012 shows small but continual increases in active transportation, as well as decreases in driving alone. Shown in Figure 10, this data includes all participating schools that collected data during each time period.

Mode Shift by Planning Area

As new schools are added to the program each year, it is difficult to track mode shift accurately in the program overall. When only accounting for schools with comparable data sets across semesters, student hand tallies show the following trends in mode shift:

- Increases in active modes in north, south, and east planning areas, and relatively steady active mode shares in the central planning area.
- The central planning area had a large increase in **shared modes**, up to 12.7% in 2013 from 9.8% in 2012. Shared modes in other planning areas remained relatively stable.
- Trips made **driving alone** decreased in the central, south, and east planning areas, and remained steady in the north planning area.




Figure 11 North Planning Area Mode Shift, Fall 2012-Fall 2013, Hand Tally Data

- Figures 11-14 detail mode shift by planning area based on hand tally data, fall 2012 to fall 2013.

Figure 12 Central Planning Area Mode Shift, Fall 2012-Fall 2013, Hand Tally Data




Figure 13 South Planning Area Mode Shift, Fall 2012-Fall 2013, Hand Tally Data





Figure 14 East Planning Area Mode Shift, Fall 2012-Fall 2013, Hand Tally Data



While the 2013-2014 data collection process continued to expand from previous years, additional data is needed to form a better picture of how the program affects families' transportation decisions. Ideally, a five-year rolling average of mode split would be useful to show the behavior change over time. The program will continue working toward this goal, which will enable a better analysis of how program frequency and numbers of events may impact transportation decisions.

It is important to recognize that behavior change usually takes many years to establish, and this data can identify specific program elements or program participation that is correlated with mode shift.

School Trends

Analyzing mode shift at a countywide scale provides an overall picture of school travel, but it does not allow for a detailed analysis of factors leading to a successful, sustained shift toward active and shared modes. Identifying trends in successful schools is an important aspect of implementing best practices countywide. Due to the geographic diversity of the County, a model school has been selected from each planning area and highlighted below. Strategies implemented at these schools can be expanded to other schools in the program.

North Planning Area

Sequoia Elementary in Oakland has shown great strides in mode shift throughout their four years in the comprehensive program, increasing active mode share by 35% from fall 2012 to fall 2013, based on student hand tallies. During the 2013-2014 school year, Sequoia participated in all countywide events, held a bike festival that included a bike rodeo, and has ongoing walking school bus routes. A new crosswalk was also installed, based on parent and school staff request.

Central Planning Area

Garfield Elementary in San Leandro has been in the comprehensive program for three years, and saw a 28% increase in active mode share from fall 2012 to fall 2013, based on student hand tallies. During the 2013-2014 school year, Garfield held monthly Walk & Roll to School Days with 80-90 students participating in each event. Safe Routes events were organized by a strong champion and supportive principal. The school participated in International Walk & Roll to School Day and Bike to School Day and plans to recruit a second parent champion to continue growing the SR2S program next year.

South Planning Area

Searles Elementary in New Haven was the first school in the New Haven Unified School District to participate in the Alameda County SR2S program, with the 2013-2014 school year representing their third year in the program. Active mode share increased by 14% from fall 2012 to fall 2013, based on student hand tallies. The school held monthly Walk & Roll to School Days, participated in all countywide events, and integrated a bike rodeo with their weekend family resource fair. The school also benefits from a strong SR2S champion.

East Planning Area

Dougherty Elementary in Dublin has been in the comprehensive program for three years, and had 100% of students get to school using active or shared modes of transportation on International Walk & Roll to School Day in fall 2013. Dougherty greatly benefits from a principal enthusiastic about the SR2S program. The school participated in all countywide events, received two BikeMobile visits, as well as a bike rodeo. Dougherty won the City of Dublin's prize for top participation on International Walk and Roll to School Day and had over 180 students participate on Bike to School Day.

Model School Trends

The key to successful increases in active and shared mode split are linked to several trends identified in these schools. In general, it takes a few years of programming for SR2S strategies to become institutionalized at a school. Each of these highlighted schools have been in the program for 3-4 years, and are seeing the benefits of programming through increases in active mode share. Participation in the countywide events, holding additional monthly Walk & Roll to School Days, and participating in pedestrian and bicyclist safety education components are shown to lead to success. Another strategy employed by these schools involves integrating several SR2S program activities together with other school events. At these schools, bike safety education was held in conjunction with a visit from the BikeMobile and other campus events, such as resource fairs. These activities were held in preparation for countywide events, primarily Bike to School Day and each of these schools had extremely successful countywide events. These strategies can be implemented in schools throughout the County.

Program Elements and Active Transportation Rates

The 2013-2014 student travel data indicates correlations between mode share and programs:

- Schools with more activities are slightly more likely to have a higher active mode share.
- Schools with walking school bus programs are slightly more likely to have higher walking mode shares.
- Schools with more bike programs are more likely to have a higher bike mode shares.




Figure 15 Walking Mode Share and Walking School Bus Programs




Figure 16 Biking Mode Share by Number of Biking Programs

Parental Perceptions


The parent survey asks questions to evaluate parents' attitudes toward various transportation modes. While parents overwhelmingly felt that walking and bicycling is important for their children's health, 37% of parents would not feel comfortable allowing their children to walk or bike to/from school without an adult at any grade.

The survey also asks parents about their concerns regarding their children walking or biking to/from school. Countywide, stranger danger (fear of child abduction) is the main concern parents have. Other concerns are primarily due to traffic safety, shown in Figure 19. 82% of parents agree or strongly agree that walking and bicycling is important for their children's health.

67% of parents agree or strongly agree that walking and biking are encouraged by their children's school.

66% of parents agree or strongly agree that walking and biking are something they wished they did more often.

The survey also asks what messages particularly resonate with parents about why to walk and bicycle. Overwhelmingly, parents felt that the message that walking and biking encourage an active, healthy lifestyle is the most effective (60%), with the secondary message being that walking and bicycling is fun for the family (37%). This represents a change from spring 2013 parent surveys, when the message that driving causes air pollution and hurts the environment was the secondary selection (28%). The environmental message resonated with about the same percentage of parents this year, but the message of fun increased significantly. This may be due to an emphasis on making the countywide events exciting, increasing the number of bike festivals throughout the County, and engaging students more directly in event planning.



29% of parents feel that improving ride share or trip share coordination would encourage shared transportation.

24% of parents felt that designating a priority drop-off or parking area would encourage shared transportation.

A Look Ahead

The Alameda County Safe Routes to School (SR2S) program aims to shift students and their families away from single-family car trips and toward the healthier, more sustainable modes of walking, biking, carpooling, and transit.

In addition to mode shift, key performance measures include the number of schools, students, and adults who participate in the program, and number of program activities conducted at each school.

Meeting Evaluation Goals

A variety of goals for the program have been tracked over time, and progress toward goals established for the 2013-2014 school year can be seen in Table 4. The program met goals for evaluation, encouragement, education, and engineering.

Highlights

The target number of schools for the 2014-2015 school year was established at 109 K-8 schools and 8 high schools. Due to additional interest in the program and applications received well above the target, the program is expanding the comprehensive track by 24% for the upcoming year and will accept 130 schools into the comprehensive program.

Expanding the Program, Ensuring Sustainability

During the 2013-2014 school year, the Alameda County SR2S program expanded the number of schools participating in the comprehensive program. As the program continues to expand year over year, the long-term goal of reaching every school in the County requires strategic decision-making regarding resource allocation and opportunities for improvement.

Meeting the goal of serving all 380 schools in the County can be accomplished by developing a new model of program participation. Currently, schools in the program are organized into two tiers: Comprehensive or Technical Assistance. Schools accepted into the comprehensive program receive one-on-one assistance, are eligible for a variety of high-quality programming free of charge,

and may receive support materials such as posters, banners, safety incentives, and safety vests. Schools not accepted into the comprehensive program may receive technical assistance from the site coordinators through their school district's Safe Routes to School Task Force, but are not eligible for free programming or safety incentives.

As schools age within the program, some now in their 7th year, active transportation and Safe Routes programming become institutionalized within the school culture. This allows for sustained mode shift with less one-on-one assistance required, allowing for resources to be focused on schools new to the program. A 'graduated' approach will be an important aspect of the program as it continues to expand. An evaluation will be conducted in the upcoming school year consisting of data that includes years in the program, number of activities, sustained mode shift toward active and shared transportation over several semesters, and markers of institutionalization, such as a PTA SRTS seat, a school-based SRTS team, and SRTS curriculum implementation. Based on these findings, a third tier for graduated schools may be implemented in the 2015-2016 school year. Schools in the graduated program can receive support through the school district SRTS Task Force rather than through oneon-one assistance, and will be eligible for some free programming, including BikeMobile visits.

Institutionalizing Safe Routes to Schools

Train the trainer program models provide the largest opportunity for institutionalization at a school, leading to sustainable programmatic growth. In Alameda County, opportunities for institutionalization include the K-5 Educator Guide, aligned with Common Core standards and provided free of charge to comprehensive schools, and the Drive Your Bike program, designed to teach PE teachers how to implement bicycle safety education in their classrooms. These options allow for SR2S programming to continue at a school while resources are focused on schools where programming has not yet been institutionalized.

Other opportunities include Safe Routes to School policies at the school district level. Schools can have a significant impact on students' health by raising awareness about active transportation and implementing policies, programs, and practices that encourage active transportation in their communities.

Overcoming Champion Turnover

Champion turnover represents an obstacle to all SR2S programs. There are several reasons for champion turnover, including students aging out of the school and staff retiring or moving to other schools. A new goal of the program will be formalizing the process by which champion responsibilities are turned over.

SR2S Champion binders may be developed throughout the school year, creating a place for school-specific SR2S records and materials. Binders will include historical information regarding organizing events, promotional materials and resources, and school-specific information, such as walking school bus maps. When the time comes for a champion to move on, this binder can be provided to the incoming champion and school staff in order to facilitate a successful transition.

Implementing a multi-champion approach is another great strategy. This model has been used at the high school level, including students, parents, and school staff, and can also be implemented at K-8 schools. Champions can be recruited from school district wellness councils, SR2S Task Forces, and volunteer organizations.

Model Strategies

Bike Festivals

Bike festivals have been linked to an increase in biking at schools. During the 2013-2014 school year, festivals were held throughout the County, including Alameda, Berkeley, Hayward, Oakland, Newark. High schools in the program also organized mini bike festivals leading up to International Walk & Roll to School and Bike to School days. In Oakland, biking increased from .11% at Sequoia Elementary in fall 2012 to 2.5% in fall 2013. Schools participating in the districtwide Berkeley Bike Festival increased from 5% to 6.2%. Organizing fun events around bike safety and repair is an important step to increase biking mode share.

Walking School Buses & Bike Trains

Participation in frequent events, such as a walking school bus or bike train, has a positive impact on mode shift for several reasons. Stranger danger has consistently ranked highest when parents are asked about their concerns with allowing their children to walk or bike to school. Walking school buses and bike trains provide a solution to this and other concerns, as students walk or bike in groups with trusted adults.

In the upcoming school year, program activities will focus on establishing frequent events at schools that have been in the program for at least a year.

Appendix A. School Participation Matrix

This appendix lists the schools that participated in the Alameda County SR2S program during the 2013-2014 school year. The table shows which program activities and events were provided at each school.

Alameda County SR2S provides two levels of assistance. Schools accepted into the comprehensive program receive one-on-one assistance from a Site Coordinator, are eligible for a variety of high-quality programming free of charge, and may receive support materials such as posters, banners, safety incentives, and safety vests. Schools not accepted into the comprehensive program may receive technical assistance from the site coordinators through their school district's Safe Routes to School Task Force, but are not eligible for free programming or safety incentives.

Note that a school's participation in the comprehensive program is voluntary. Program activities are organized and delivered through the combined effort of Alameda County SR2S Site Coordinators and each school's Champion (typically a parent, principal, or teacher who volunteers their time). Unless otherwise noted, this matrix does not include SR2S programming that occurred separately from the Alameda County SR2S program and therefore it may not be a comprehensive list of every event or activity that was organized at a school during the 2013-2014 school year.









This year, Safe Routes continued to partner with the Earth Team at Albany High School to carry out events and projects. Consisting of approximately 10 students from all grades, the group met at lunch every Thursday in the science classroom of teacher Champion Patricia Fujiwara. Students took on Safe Routes as one of their focus areas, also spending time organizing the school's recycling program. Leaders from the Earth Team are highly self-motivated, creating agendas in advance of each meeting and accomplishing all tasks laid out independent of reminders.

This year, Albany High School carried out the three big events - Walk & Roll Day, the Golden Sneaker Contest, and Bike to School Day - exceeding last year's participation numbers by 30 - 50% for each event. In the Fall, students organized a mini bike festival in preparation for International Walk & Roll to School Day. In addition to hosting the bike blender, trivia wheel, and BikeMobile, students created a composting toss game to educate their peers about how to organize their trash. They also invited a student DJ, all of which added to the fun and visibility of the event.

For the second year in a row, Albany High School boasted the highest number of participants in the Golden Sneaker contest, with 720 students competing for the trophy. Their success can be primarily attributed to the fact that our teacher champion was able to convince most of the teachers in the science department to participate. Earth Team calculated mid-contest and final tallies for teachers, taking responsibility off their shoulders entirely. This was highly appealing for participating teachers, who are quite busy throughout the year.

Our Bike to School Day event was also successful with an increase of 50% participation this year. Students attempted to increase social media use by creating posters displaying gift card prizes and the hashtag #AHSBikeDay. Students who posted to social media with the hashtag were eligible to win a prize (provided by STAY funds). Although we had high levels of participation in our event, we only had one photo submission - a group of teachers. We are thinking about why this contest didn't take off, and what we can do next time to increase participation.















Our work this year at Irvington High School was highly successful, despite this only being our second year at the school. We had great support from administrative Champion Vice Principal Jay Jackson, strong teacher Champion Greg Canavero, and an awesome group of students to help roll out events and projects. This year, we met weekly with the Green Advisory - a class of about 30 students. This group is committed to environmental issues, with several highly motivated leaders. One of our key student Champions, Tiffany, also served as President of Student Leadership, which allowed us to seamlessly organize school wide events.

This was our first International Walk & Roll Day on campus. and it was organized and carried out successfully. As with other schools, students helped organize and publicize a mini bike festival prior to the event, to prepare students to participate.

This year, students also decided to pilot the Cocoa for Carpools event. One Junior created stellar online social media promotion, which was shared on Instagram, Facebook and Twitter. Students arrived to school very early to help make cocoa in the cafeteria, with borrowed supplies from the cooking teacher, which was a bit labor intensive. Next year, we may seek to source prepared cocoa from a nearby store, which would reduce the amount of work needed to host this event. Regardless, students had a great time welcoming their peers with cocoa in the morning.

This year, the Golden Sneaker contest continued to gain popularity, with support from Vice Principal Jay Jackson leading the charge to build enthusiasm and competition amongst teachers. Students decided to

award two prizes - highest level of participation, and highest mileage per student. This way, they would celebrate carbon emissions reduction more directly. Students in Green Advisory created a thermometer that gaged last year's savings as compared to this year. They were responsible for doing the math in participating classrooms, which helped motivate more teachers to

participate. This year, our numbers were up by 38% in terms of student participation in the contest. Next year, Jay Jackson declared

that all classes will be expected to participate, throughout the entire school - a very exciting prospect! If this were the case, we would encourage classes to designate a student representative to add posters each week, and report back to Green Advisory.

This year marked our second annual Bike to School Day event on Irvington campus, and our participation increased by 73%. Again, students promoted the event by creating a very cool online flyer that included

Students participated in a two day training, which was supposed to lead to a culminating field trip. Unfortunately, with weather and testing this became hard to schedule.









































This year, we continued partnering with Oakland Technical High School, carrying out several successful events and projects. Our participation in Walk & Roll to School Day increased by 62% and Bike to School Day by an impressive 618% this year, primarily due to a partnership that we have been cultivating with the organization BuildOn. Students in BuildOn meet weekly to identify and sign up for volunteer opportunities. We were fortunate to partner with their leaders to promote both Walk & Roll and Bike to School Day, which led to much higher levels of participants this year, and more well organized events. BuildOn also helped organize a mini bike festival in preparation for Walk & Roll Day. Unfortunately, our end of year BikeMobile visit was canceled due to rain.

Based on our walk audit last year, AC Transit invited Safe Routes staff to participate in a planning process to determine an updated location for the 51 bus stop. We utilized the improvement plan - created with input from parents, administrators, city staff and planners - to identify the proper location for the bus stop, and to advocate for an electronic NextBus sign at the bus stop. It was extremely useful to have this information to share, based on our work directly with the school community.

Safe Routes continues to participate in Oakland Technical High School's Wellness Committee. Next year, we hope to find an additional teacher champion, and to continue partnering with BuildOn.

Reach Academy had a high level of involvement in the program this year. After several meetings the Police helped the school launch a Traffic Safety Patrol in January 2013. Since then, Reach Academy has had two traffic squads operating every day to help students cross to the school in the mornings at two major intersections and to help with the drop-off zone loading/unloading.



We had a very busy year at Foothill High School, with four successful events, and work on several ongoing infrastructure projects. This year, we aligned Walk & Roll to School Day with homecoming, creating a competition between classes - a great motivator for students which led to a 13% increase in participation.

This was our second year holding a carpool event at Foothill High School, and numbers increased by 64%. We piloted the event Cocoa for Carpools, where students received hot cocoa for carpooling with their peers or families to school. The City of Pleasanton sponsored cocoa through Child Nutrition Services, and it was set up for us in a very easy and effective way before we arrived to host the event. Members of the Safe Routes Club handed out tickets to students who carpooled, and other students proved participation by posting a picture of their carpool (NOT while driving) and using the hashtag #cocoaforcarpools. This was our first attempt at utilizing this social media tool to increase event participation and excitement, and it worked. Students posted cool pictures, we had high attendance, and everyone had a great time. Our strategy for publicizing this event was to create a short video (bit.ly/fhscocoaforcarpools) and fun flyer. We also hosted a photo booth that made students look like they were in a car together. Our Parent Champion provided silly costumes and a steering wheel for use in pictures.

This year at Foothill High School, we increased participation in all events, including the Golden Sneaker Contest (up by 60%). Students created a video to train teachers that we will be updating and using countywide in next year's contest (bit.ly/goldensneakertraining). Members of the Safe Routes Club decided to add complexity to the contest by holding a drawing for students who participated in the contest every day, and for the student with

the highest number of miles traveled. Students won iTunes gift cards, purchased with funds from MTC's STAY program. This year, the Freshman Global Studies class won the Golden Sneaker contest with 100% participation, and their teacher commented that the contest fit perfectly into their studies of human environmental impact.

Our final event this year, Bike to School Day, was our most successful with a 75% increase in participation. Throughout the year, we partnered with student

Leadership to enhance publicity. We were able to hone in on our collaboration strategy, and utilize it on Bike to School Day, by providing a script for Leadership Liaisons to make announcements in classes. We also held a drawing for additional iTunes gift cards on Bike to School Day, as a motivator for students to participate. The City of Pleasanton donated bananas, and created a large banner which we have used for the past three years. We hosted an official energizer station, welcoming commuters and student riders. We also had a visit from Pleasanton's Mayor Jerry Thorne, and Councilwoman Kathy Narum.

In addition to hosting great events, students at Foothill High School focused on several infrastructure projects to increase the safety of the campus. In partnership with Alta Planning & Design and Pleasanton Unified School District Facilities Department, we designed and plan to apply for funds from BAAQMD to implement additional bike racks on campus. Students participated in a design workshop with Alta Planning, to create designs and a budget for the project. The racks are the first step to improving the rear entrance to campus for pedestrian and cyclists. Students are working on a video outlining the issue, which will be utilized in fundraising efforts next year.

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We continued hosting the carpool parking lot this year, with some challenges regarding administration and publicity. While students are utilizing the spaces, it will be important to find an on campus administrator for the parking lot next year.

















Another key

component of this year's program was our third annual month-long transportation unit, as part of the school's Green Urban Design class. Students worked with Alameda County Public Works Planner Paul Keener to create a proposal for funding the Ashland Underpass design project they started last year. This was a great opportunity to continue the work of students in last year's program, who performed a walk audit of the area and presented their design proposal. Paul Keener is hoping to fund and carry out the project in the next two years. Students also focused on changing the AC Transit bus schedule for the primary bus lines that serve their school. They carried out a survey to identify what lines students take and key issues with service, then wrote a memo to communicate concerns to AC Transit. Students shared the memo through AC Transit's online complaint form, and met with AC Transit Transportation Planner John Urgo. After their meeting, Mr. Urgo carried out the students' request and changed the schedule. Changes will go into effect in August. A big win!
