



On Tracks and Wheels


Some children in big cities may take a **subway** to school. A subway is a train that runs underground.

Over Water and Snow


Some children live near the water. They may take a **boat** to school.

A snowmobile drives on top of deep snow. These children almost never miss school because of snow!




On Animals and On Foot
